

Thank you - Society constitution feedback

On behalf of the Society's Directors, our thanks to everyone who has provided feedback on the proposed constitution in the past months. A revised draft dated 27 February 2025 was sent to members on Thursday. Look out for the Notice of General Meeting, together with the final document, which will be sent to members in the coming days. **A general meeting to vote on the new constitution has been scheduled for Wednesday 2 April 2025 at 6.00pm AEDT.**


