





What Happens to Your DNA When a Company Folds?

With 23andMe filing for bankruptcy, questions are being raised about the future of its users' genetic data—now in the hands of a bankruptcy court. While there's a chance for protective measures to be put in place, the situation highlights a broader issue: how little control individuals may have once personal data is collected.

This isn't a call to panic (I have not deleted my 23andMe data)—but it's a timely reminder of the need for stronger privacy protections, especially when it comes to sensitive information like DNA.
